## Program overview

- The Developmental Learning Center (DLC) is a regional special education program for children from 12-18 years of age who fall within the Autism Spectrum Disorder continuum or who exhibit severe language impairment.
- It is comprised of the middle school and high school components.
- DLC is a highly structured program for children with severe developmental disabilities who require an alternate special education placement.
- The Developmental Learning Center offers intensive positive behavioral support via use of structured environments and a low student-to-staff ratio, functional communication training, and functional academics.
- The program also offers many opportunities for community based instructional vocational training and social/recreational experiences.

# Program philosophy

- The program is designed to facilitate the transition from school to adult life. Applying the SCERTS and Developmental Therapy models and utilizing a functional curriculum, the activities in this program focus on assisting students to become as independent as possible in domestic, community and vocational settings.
- The development of personal management skills such as hygiene, grooming, and domestic living skills are fundamental to success in these environments and are an integral part of the DLC program. In addition the development of appropriate social skills, behaviors and communication skills are a major focus throughout all activities.

## Transition services

Students and their families work closely with teachers and the C.E.S. vocational transition specialist to design and implement individual transition plans. Transition planning begins when a student turns 15 and charts the path toward successful integration into adulthood. At age 18, students join the Transition Learning Component.

# The DLC staff

The program staff includes a group of highly skilled special education teachers, teaching assistants, a clinical team consisting of social workers, nurses, speech pathologists, BCBAs, occupational and physical therapists as well as secretarial and administrative personnel.
